

## Mr. NG CHI CHING.

Mr. Ng is a native of Chang Shan District, Kwongtung Province, where he was born in 1890. A few years' early education pursuing Chinese knowledge in his own village enabled him to obtain a fair result in the subject. When he was sixteen, he was brought to Hongkong by his brother in order to continue his studies as well as to further his knowledge. In the following year, he entered the Queen's College and there he stayed until he was twenty-three when he graduated.

In the same year, he started his business career as a staff in the Clark & Co. Then he turned to work in the Messageries Maritimes, and afterwards in the Taikoo Dock. Three years later he worked in the Sincere & Co., Ltd., a famous universal provider, as a clerk. With his ability and intellegence, he was promoted gradually to the position of assistant superintendent of the firm with a long service of seven years. Finally the terminate selection of him as manager of the Singapore branch office forced him to resign on account of his unwilling departure from Hongkong and concurrently his ambition to establish his own business.

He founded the China Mercantile Co., and with his experience he furthered the business in the utmost extent. The famous Strike of Hongkong in 1925 effected him heavily and he was forced to sell the business. The new partners found him very useful in the future pronotion of the business, so he was offered with the position as manager of the firm. In 1928, he established the Kwong Tat & Co. dealing with photographic instruments and at the same time, as representative of different European and American Textile manufacturers. His experience and his abilities enable him to make the firm one of the most prominent commercial plants in Hongkong.

Mr. Ng is also very active in social affairs. He has been a member of the committee of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce; Chairman of the Tung Chai Association; delegate of Chinese Piece goods Association; director of the Chung Shan Association and a few others.
