Dr. F. I. TSEUNG, M.B., B.S. (Hong Kong)

Dr. Tseung Fat Im (prefers English rendering F. I. Tseung), was born in Hongkong in 1903. He received his early education at Ellis Kadoorie School and later at Queen's College. In 1920 he passed his Matriculation Examination and entered the University of Hongkong with the Canton Government Scholarship studying medicine. Both at Queen's College and at the University he had received numerous prizes and scholarships notably the Belilios, Jordan and Ho Fook Scholarships. He graduated from the University in 1925 with the degree of M.B., B.S. He was then offered the post of Clinical Assistant to the Medical Unit working under the late Prof. Anderson at the Government Civil Hospital for a period of eighteen months making a special study of Biochemistry and Diabetes Mellitus and had written an article entitled "Diabetes Mellitus—The Significance of Bio-chemical Tests in its Diagnosis and Treatment." At the same time he was in charge of a large morning out-patient department at the Government Civil Hospital. Since vacating that post he had devoted himself to private practice specialising in Biochemistry and Diabetes. In 1931 he had a world tour visiting medical clinics in Europe and America and also had postgraduate study in Rotunda Hospital, Dublin, London Hospital, Queen Charlotte's Maternity Hospital and Infant's Hospital, London and also in Vienna. Since his return to Hong Kong he entered into partnership with Dr. Arthur W. Woo.

Resides his attention to medical practice Dr. Tseung is well known in all societies and philanthropic organizations in which he invariably serves either as executive officer or committee member.

Realising the importance of mass education in Public Health and Preventive Medicine in China, both at the Hongkong Chinese Medical Association and at the Y's Men's Club he was actively responsible for the organization of Health Campaigns in conjunction with the Chinese Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. and under the auspices of the Y's Men's Club he was responsible for the organization of a Health Education Class, for the training of a group of intelligent young men to give periodical health talks to the masses. So enthusiastic was he in this work that his lectures were frequently heard either at the Y.M.C.A. of at the Hong Kong Broadcasting Station.

In 1930 when the New Territories Medical Benevolent Society was formed he was one of the founders and Hon. Secretary and Treasurer until the analgamation with the St. John Ambulance Association to form the St. John Ambulance New Territories Medical Benevolent Branch and is still now Joint Secretary to the latter. He is also a life member and Divisional Surgeon of the St. John Ambulance Association and Brigade.

In 1932 during the Sino-Japanese trouble at Shanghai he was one of the organizers of the Hong Kong Medical Relief Committee and served as its Hon. Secretary.

In 1926 he was graduate representative and for three terms he was Hon. Treasurer of the Hong Kong University Medical Society. He was for three successive terms Hon. Secretary and Treasurer and once Vice-president of the Hong Kong Chinese Medical Association and is at present serving as a member in its Council. He had served at the University Club and Hong Kong University Graduates' Association as a member of the Committee. For four successive terms he has been serving as a member of the Council of the British Medical Association, Hong Kong and China Branch representing the Chinese. He was Hon. Secretary and Treasurer of the National Medical Association of China, Hong Kong Branch. He is a life fellow of the Chinese Medical Association, a member of the American Medical Association of Vienna and also a member of the Fellowship of Medicine, London, England.

In 1930 he was appointed by the Hong Kong Government as a Member of the Medical Board, which post he has held for two successive terms of three years each.

From 1930—1934 he was Hon, lecturer to the nurses at Tung Wah Hospital and for three years he was himself financially responsible for the running of a free medical clinic under the auspices of the Chinese Buddhist's Association.

He was a charter member of the Y's Men's Club of Hong Kong and has been continuously serving for five years on its Board of Directors, having been once its Director, three years its Vice-present and now its President.

In an honorary capacity he serves as Physician to the Si-Nan College, St. Paul's Girls' College and Chinese Y.W.C.A.

Outside his medical sphere he serves as a member of committee in various local organizations such as the Sze Yap Commercial and Industrial Association, Sun Wui Commercial Society and lately was appointed to the General Committee of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce. He has been for three terms Vice-president of the Chinese Merchants' Association, a post which he is still holding. He is an Hon. Director of the Chinese Studies and also assistant secretary to the Tai Po Rural Orphanage.

Recently at the Hong Kong Oversea Chinese Election of members for the coming National Congress at Nanking he was appointed one of the supervisors for the voting papers.

Incidentally it may be mentioned that he is a member of the Euro-American Returned Students' Union, a member of the China Institute of Pacific Relations, and also a member of the Rotary Club of Hong Kong.

He has many other public activities notably Volunteer to the Hong Kong Street Sleepers' Shelter Society etc. Besides his busy practice, Dr. Tseung has devoted most of his spare time in social and charitable works.

He is still single and his hobby is hiking and reading, as well as collecting of old Chinese literature.
