

Mr. C. H. Wong is one of the prominent merchants of Hongkong who has achieved success through combats against hardship and difficulty. He is a native of Shun Tak District, Kwangtung Province, and was born in 1877.

He was not born with the proverbial silver spoon in his month and therefore could burdly procure a thorough education. When he was but a boy, he was employed in the Kowloon Godown and Wharf. He stayed there for many years and later he began his activities in the lumber line.

A certain European who was manager of a lumber firm had a stock of timber, which he could not find a patron to purchase the lot. Consequently, he confided the matter to Mr. Wong, who showed his business accumen with the fact that the stock was entirely sold out within the shortest span of time.

Since then, his name began to spread in the commercial sphere. Mr. Wong has established, under the name of Wong Tong Kee, altogether nine Saw-mills in Hongkong, Canton and Macao.

Many of the magnificient structures in Hongkong and in China were contracted or supplied by Mr. Wong Such as the I-Ho Yuan Carden in Peking, which was to be frequented only by the Royal Family of the Ching Dynasty before the Chinese Revolution; the Rail-roads of various Provinces in China; the building of the Public Works Department, Hongkong; the Rail-road of Kowloon Canton Railway; the various famous Docks; the piers of Kowloon Wharf; the Wharf of China Merchant Navigation Co; the gorgeous editice of the Hongkong & Shanghai Banking Corporation; and many others.

Mr. Wong is Chairman of the Kwong Wah Hospital, Chairman of Fir Merchants' Association; Chairman of Lumber Merchants' Association; Chairman of Chinese Contractors' Association; Chairman of Wong's Club; Principal of the Tsim-sha-tsui School, Director of Teck Meng College, and member of Po Leung Kuk Committee. Mr. Wong has proposed that in the nearest future a free school will be established with his own expenses.
